I'm remembering words I have often heard from the staff and residents at the Women's Refuge: help, hope, and healing. I found these words to describe the journey many of us take as we open ourselves to God and His power to transform us into who He wants us to be. One's brokenness might not be a broken body, but a broken self on the inside which also results in devastation...such as woundedness, rejection, fragility, or depression to name a few.

Many of us need help to understand rightly who God is and who we are in Christ – that we belong to Him. Colossians 3:10 reads, "We are renewed as we learn to know our Creator and become like Him." We become confident in Christ when we experience the truth of who He is, where once we were, perhaps, frightened, bruised, or broken.

Once we rightly embrace that God is our Father and we belong to Him, He opens the door for us to courageously face those things that weigh us down. From Matthew 11:28-30, "*Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest...you will find rest for your souls.*" God can provide us with a cooperative heart, space, and His healing power "to draw us upward to holiness." (John Stott). As we believe these ultimate truths, hope flourishes and grounds our faith. Paul tells us in Philippians 1:6 that "God, who began the good work within you, will continue His work until it is finally finished on the day when Christ Jesus returns." What lavish hope! Katherine Wolf, having suffered a massive brain stem stroke at 26, followed by years of other unrelated life-threatening diagnoses,

wrote, "I can build a foundation of trust in God's plan and an indestructible identity as His beloved, which can resist the crush of suffering."

That quote describes what is being written on the hearts of so many women who come to the Women's Refuge for help, hope, and healing. The Lord meets them here to help them with His resurrection power because they are His beloved.
